Summary: This paper is part of an ongoing concern for monitoring stress amongst members of the New Zealand Police. Prof. Taylor and Dr Frazer were asked in consultation with Dr. W. Treadwell, Director of Police Medical Services, to provide stress counselling and monitor stress effects on rescue and mortuary team workers following the Air New Zealand DC10 disaster. Results are not yet complete but an interim report of 29 rescue workers is presented with results and recommendations. Further data from the mortuary team and the ice recovery team are still under collection and these will be used for comparison and analysis. The results will be reported in due course, and both will be computer analysed.

Summary: Discusses the media involvement in the Air New Zealand Crash on Mt Erebus on November 28, 1979 in which 275 people were killed. Focussing upon the recovery of the bodies and the role of the media and issues such as lack of Control and Command, the difficult and dangerous environment for the recovery team, media liaison, issuing of press releases, convergence of the media at the Police Operation Centres in Auckland and Wellington, Air New Zealand's public relations and the identification of 83% of the bodies leaving only 44 unidentified remains. 20 Mins
